The Regular Council Meeting convened on Monday, September 26, 2016 at 7:00 PM, in the Council Chambers of the Safety Administration Building. The meeting was called to order by Charlotte Whipkey, President of Council, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and a moment of silent prayer.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

Mr. Rodgers stated that he would be asking for discussion regarding the video and sound equipment later in the evening under old business.

Service Dept. Vehicle Purchase

Mr. Pierson moved to add Ord #83-2016 to the agenda, seconded by Mr. Tousley.

Motion passed 7-0. Ms. Whipkey stated this issue was also just addressed during a meeting of the Board of Control just prior to our meeting.

Ms. Whipkey stated that she had made a mistake last week with roll call for the last Special Council Meeting and had noted that Mr. Rodgers was excused and Mr. Pierson indicated Mr. Rodgers would be tardy but eventually would show up for the meeting. Mr. Rodgers did not show so he would be recorded as unexcused. Mr. Rodgers stated he was unaware of his schedule for that time and it was also not a mandatory meeting, however you can mark it however you like.

Presentation by Dan Karant-Summit County Public Health Issue

Mr. Karant discussed several updates from the County Board of Health such as a syringe drop off program that was for unused, packaged syringes which could be brought to his store and the flu vaccines (see attached) that he recommended not getting before October 1st. Mr. Rodgers asked about used medication drop off locations as he believed Barberton has one.

Mr. Karant answered that each City has a location for the medication. Mr. Karant stated that the Fire Department has a drop box that was donated by CVS Pharmacy. Mr. Rodgers clarified the place in Barberton was a clinic of some type and they reused medications. Mr. Karant stated that what Mr. Rodgers is referring to is the Free Clinic in Barberton and wasn't sure if they offered that as he was not directly involved with it. Mr. Karant added he recommended Open M, in Akron as they do try and reuse some medications, but suggested calling them. Mr. Karant also discussed the Medication take back day will be November 5, 2016 at the Medicine Shoppe Pharmacy from 10:00 AM to 1:00 PM. Mr. Pelot asked if there will also be a gun take back on that day and Mr. Karant replied yes, Officer Sams would be on site for this event.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE PUBLIC-Agenda and Non-Agenda Items

Mr. William Paluch, 3740 Shellhart Road, Norton, Ohio asked where are his answers to his previous questions regarding the Equalization Board process? Mr. Rodgers asked if all of Council received his initial questions and Ms. Whipkey replied yes. Mr. Rodgers stated that he would take the time to go through the minutes and provide him with the answers so we do not have to keep going through this each meeting.

Mr. Jason Sams, 3782 Long Drive, Norton, Ohio, discussed his concerns regarding Ord. #82-2016 for the Community Center Fees, and he noted the rates being doubled for non-residents. Mr. Sam's thanked Mr. Messner for his time explaining these details to him. Mr. Sams thanked Mr. McGlone's previous comments that the rental fees should not be a money maker for the City and he agreed. Mr. Sams discussed the fact that many of these renters are not from the community and they do come here to shop and eat in Norton and he considers them as a potential customer or resident. Mr. Sams stated he had spoken to Mr. Messner and they both agree that Norton could be a possible halfway point for those coming from Cleveland or elsewhere and he personally did not want to see us turning away potential business. Mr. Sams suggested we raise the rates over a five (5) year time frame instead of all at once. Mr. Sams discussed the application process which can be found on line. Mr. Sams suggested showcasing our local business in a pamphlet that lets you know where you can find businesses for flowers, balloons, catering options, etc. We really need to showcase these businesses to any potential new customer; let's not just hand them the rules and regulations.

INTRODUCTION OF NEW LEGISLATION

ORD #74-2016

Mr. Pierson offered Ord. #74-2016 for its first reading and asked the Clerk to read it:

AN ORDINANCE ACCEPTING THE BID OF CAVANAUGH BUILDING CORPORATION IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$363,136.93 FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE SILVER SPRINGS DRIVE RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

First reading only. Mr. Pelot stated he is reading this ordinance and he understands the parties have not signed at this point. Mr. Pelot stated that he wanted to amend this to make sure that we on Council have fulfilled our obligation and protect the City’s money. Mr. Pelot moved to amend the legislation to state that the private construction is contingent on all parties signing, seconded by Mr. Kernan. Mr. Pierson stated he believes this is very fair and that the parties involved would like to see this body pass it first before they all sign off. Mr. Pelot agreed adding that this just protects our side of things. Mr. Kernan stated that we could vote on the amendment and waive the readings this evening to get this project moving and Mr. Pierson stated that it is his intention to do so. Mr. Pierson stated he was sure the residents are honorable, they have given us their word, and we need to keep ours. Mr. Markey stated it will say no public dollars are to be used until the signatures are in place so that we are not misusing public funds. Ms. Whipkey asked how long they have to sign off and Mrs. Carr replied she has three (3) that have signed off and we are waiting for four (4) more which she has appointments for three (3) of them scheduled for tomorrow, and there is one (1) party she has not heard back from. Mrs. Carr stated she wants to have everything wrapped by tomorrow; the contractor is ready to go and every day we delay is a day we lose to start working. Mrs. Carr stated she would like to see the legislation and all signed off by the end of this week. Mr. Markey noted nothing will start until all of the paperwork is signed and in place so he was not sure we needed a time limit. Mr. Tousley asked if we can have this amendment prepared now so that we can all see this before we vote on this later this evening. Mr. Markey stated he would work on the language now. Mrs. Carr noted that we have a notary on staff this evening; Mrs. Richards can notarize for anyone here this evening that wishes to sign off; we will stay after the meeting to handle this.

Mr. Pierson offered Ord. #83-2016 for its first reading and asked the Clerk to read it:

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER TO ENTER INTO AN AGREEMENT TO PURCHASE A 2006 FORD F-450 XL SUPER DUTY FROM TRY AUTO SALES CORP., AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Mr. Pierson moved to waive the second and third readings, seconded by Mr. Pelot. Mr. Pierson explained the need to rush this is because Mr. Reynolds and our mechanic Mr. Hutchings have found this needed used vehicle at the low cost of \$28,000.00 and we have to act quickly to get this. We have the cash so we do not need to do any financing for this vehicle. The replacement is for a one ton super duty Ford; the rocker panels are badly corroded on both sides, underneath and into the chassis on the current vehicle. This has had numerous transmission issues on it at around 96,000 miles on it and we need to replace it at some point. Mr. Pierson noted this is in really good shape and originally came from Florida. Mr. McGlone asked how many miles are on this used replacement and Mr. Pierson replied it's 46,000. Mr. Rodgers stated this is a dump truck right, and Mr. Pierson replied no it's a one ton super duty pick-up truck and Mr. Messner noted this has an eleven (11) foot bed on it. Mr. Pierson stated it has a small dump on it and we are anticipating its use for small jobs and very light plowing, basically used to pull equipment like our durapatcher. It's not intended to be used for heavy street maintenance. Mr. Tousley asked what a new vehicle would cost and Mr. Messner replied, it would be over \$80,000.00. Mr. Tousley asked is it typical to get up to 90,000 miles or has this vehicle just been out performed? Mr. Messner replied that vehicle has gone through five (5) transmissions in its life time. Mr. Pelot added he felt it was atypical to go through five transmissions. Mr. Pierson stated that he had asked about the transmission issues we are having and no one, including Ford could explain the reason for this or a solution. Mr. Pierson stated this seems to be an adequate vehicle for what we want to do and it did come from the south and has no rust on the sub frame or the body. This could easily get us through the next 3-4 years and could get us down the road a little.

Ms. Whipkey asked if we will be undercoating this and Mr. Messner replied yes. Mr. Pierson stated this is not intended to be used for salting or brining but more for light construction. Mr. Tousley asked if we have looked at this vehicle and Mr. Pierson replied yes Mr. Hitchings did inspect this. Mr. Messner noted we have purchased other vehicles from this same vendor.

INTRODUCTION OF PRIOR LEGISLATION

ORD #71-2016

Mr. Pelot offered Ord. #71-2016 for its third reading and asked the Clerk to read it:

AN ORDINANCE APPROVING AMENDMENTS TO THE PLANS FOR THE NASH HEIGHTS GRAVITY SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS PUMP STATION

PHASE II, AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE AND DELIVER AN AGREEMENT WITH BARBERTON FOR THE TRANSFER OF THE RESPONSIBILITY OF CONSTRUCTING THE NASH HEIGHTS GRAVITY SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Mr. Pelot moved to adopt Ord. #71-2016, seconded by Whipkey. Mr. Tousley asked Mr. Markey assuming that the signatures are valid on the referendum, what is the impact on this legislation? Mr. Markey stated since the referendum deals with the sewer agreement with Barberton, there would be no transfer to the City of Barberton, and this ordinance would not have any effect later on. Mr. Tousley stated so if that scenario happens and there was a vote passed next November this would just be in place at that point and Mr. Markey concurred. Mr. Rodgers asked if it goes to the November 2017 election, Norton can still fulfill the EPA mandate to comply and build the system, and Mr. Markey noted that is correct. Mr. Markey added that we have a bid and if we pass this legislation now, we can award that contract at a later time. Mr. Rodgers stated that in passing this legislation we are amending the plans for Phase II and Mr. Markey concurred. Mr. Rodgers asked if we award the construction that is for the entire project and Mr. Markey replied yes. Mr. Rodgers stated so this is not going to mess us up and Mr. Markey responded that's correct.

Motion passed 4-3 however; the emergency clause will not take effect. That needed five (5) yeas for this to take effect. Ordinance #71-2016 will not go into effect until 30 days from the date of the Mayors signature.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Mr. Rodgers noted that Mr. Messner has received a bid on the streaming costs to present to cost and the total is about \$10,400.00. The streaming is about \$1,400.00 for the fifteen (15) months, which is a better deal than what we had before and what was first proposed to Council. Mr. Rodgers asked to have this item next week's agenda under the Committee of the Whole. Mr. Messner stated Council has already seen Mr. Ring's estimate of \$8,932.00. Mr. Messner stated that Livestream would not work with the new equipment and he did reach out to WOUSA and they have failed to respond. Mr. Messner stated that he did reach out to another streaming company called UStream. They quickly responded and felt that their silver plan would best suit our needs and they want to do billing for fifteen (15) months for which will need two (2) purchase orders one for this year and one for next year for a total of \$1,485.00 and is the total for the streaming platform and full support. Mr. Messner noted this is based on usage and can increase over time. Although they will bill monthly, they prefer to do a whole year and we can adjust it as we go to fit our needs. Mr. Messner explained there would be a new camera in the back of the room above the video room with a wider view and will have a new podium, new microphones and bases. The front of the metal desks could be lined with wood grain to match the room. Mr. Messner stated we are talking about 3-4 weeks to get everything up and running and the live streaming would end up being about \$1,000.00 less a year. Mr. Messner stated it may be possible to have it up and running sometime in November.

Mr. Rodgers stated he is hopeful that this will solve all of the issues we have been having. If this is the case he felt this Council could step away from this issue and be done with it. Mr. Pierson asked about the retention of meetings and the costs involved. Mr. Messner stated we will be saving our own meetings on a devise that Mrs. Richards already has. When the minutes are approved the videos are generally deleted. Mr. Rodgers asked to have discussion at the next Work Session under Committee of the Whole. Mr. Rodgers asked Mrs. Richards to check with other Clerks and see what their process is for deleting the archived videos. Mrs. Richards indicated that she would; however she believes most communities follow their retention schedules, which is formatted from the Ohio Historical Society. Mr. Markey stated that since this is two different vendors here and each are under the \$10,000.00 threshold there is no need to take this to the Board of Control or Council to approve with legislation, it can just be a voice vote to go out and do this next week.

From the Summit County Board of Health

1. Summit County Public Health has begun a Syringe Exchange Program this past summer. The Medicine Shoppe Pharmacy here in Norton will be beginning a pilot program to accept donated syringes to be distributed through this program. During the Medication Take Back days in the past, Norton residents have tried to dispose of full boxes of entirely unused syringes and needles from a diabetic who has passed away or been moved into a nursing home. They no longer need the syringes, but no one will take them back. Because of that, I would suggest that they donate them to the SCPH Syringe Exchange Program.

This program is designed to stop the spread of disease. It is not enabling current addicts to use drugs. They already are using drugs and they are using whatever syringes and needles they can come by and passing the syringe from person to person. This spreads diseases like Hepatitis B & C, AIDS/HIV, and many other blood borne pathogens. Access to clean syringes in the Cleveland program has enabled thousands of drug users to avoid personal contact with these diseases and acts to stop the spread of them. This program is being brought to Summit County. It is not the exact program, we have developed our own guidelines and qualifications.

During this process, counselors will develop relationships with those seeking syringes and other devices being made available to the addicted people who take advantage of this program. It is a way to reach those who have been unreachable without fear of incarceration. In doing so, our counselors can guide those who want out through the process of recovery.

Syringes being donated must be in fully intact packaging. No syringe by itself that is not in a sealed package will be accepted. Since it is not a hugely financed program, this is an attempt to appeal to our citizens to donate and stop the spread of disease. The cost of treating those diseases is what currently eats at your tax dollars to pay for recovery or maintenance of patients who acquire currently untreatable diseases. There is a very high societal and financial cost. Please consider donating to this program.

I am not asking for City Council to take any action. I am asking that we promote this program to help stop or slow the spread of diseases.

2. Influenza Vaccinations

I have wanted to discuss timing of vaccination and efficacy of influenza vaccine for some time. Sadly, many chain pharmacies have promoted early vaccination since they want your healthcare dollars before some competitor gets them. This is more a business decision on their part than good medicine or science. There is more to this than I will report, but the key point is that influenza vaccines have recently been shown to be most effective up to 180 days after vaccinations. They were shown to be about 60% effective on the average and more specifically between 41 to 72 % as a range. However, after 180 days this protection drops to less than 11%. So, since influenza season in this part of the country starts usually around the end of December if it is early and continues into April the next year, those who get vaccinated before October 1st may not have the protection that they paid for or think that they have. As a point of information, I would like to

Defense beneficiaries who attended outpatient facilities in San Diego and Great Lakes, Illinois.

Outpatient febrile respiratory illness surveillance data were used to assess the effectiveness of the vaccine. Age, calendar season, and influenza season were taken into account in the analysis.

Of the 1720 participants, 75% were younger than 25 years and 55% were female. Complete data were available on 1522 of the participants.

The investigators found that vaccine effectiveness ranged from 40% to 69%, depending on the flu season.

This research offers interesting insights into the vaccine's effectiveness, said Cecile Viboud, PhD, from the division of epidemiology and population studies at the National Institutes of Health, in Bethesda, Maryland.

"It is reassuring to know that traditional vaccines have a protection lasting 6 months, which can be useful when immunization campaigns are early and the influenza season is particularly late," she told *Medscape Medical News*.

"Whether traditional vaccines offer protection that goes beyond 6 months warrants further studies," she added.

Immunizing Children

Dr Viboud presented the second study, which looked at the immunization of children. Data on annual vaccination rates were obtained from the National Immunization Survey and the Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System.

Her team found that pediatric flu vaccination was directly associated with a reduction in hospitalizations in children, and indirectly, although more weakly, affected adults.

Flu vaccination rates in children increased from 0% in 2000 to approximately 52% in 2012, which reflected a recommendation for vaccination coverage of children younger than 5 years issued by the US Advisory Committee of Immunization Practices. There were, however, disparities in vaccination rates among states.

Vaccination significantly reduced hospitalization for pneumonia, influenza, and respiratory and circulatory diseases in those 19 years and younger ($P < .0001$).
